SWIMWEAR IS DOING WELL!

The swimwear market is experiencing double digit growth in France with €315,5 million in sales.

+ 13,1 % FOR PURCHASES OF WOMEN'S SWIMWEAR.

In 2022, sales of women's swimwear in France increased by 13.1% (vs 2021) to around €232 million.

+ 25,4 % FOR PURCHASES OF MEN'S SWIMWEAR.

With an even more positive momentum, sales of men's swimwear increased by 25.4% (vs 2021) for an estimated market, in France, of €83.5 million.

THE SUMMER MARKET IS SWIMMING IN JOY!

The sales of swimwear are progressing again, confirming their rebound after years of the global pandemic.

The extensive travel, the involvement of French consumers in aquatic sports and recreational activities, the growth of the beauty and spa industry as well as the growing popularity of high-end swimwear are the main growth factors of the market.

The swimsuit has also become a staple of the women's wardrobe. Trendy, innovative and more sustainable, it is directly inspired by ready-to-wear fashion shows. A true piece of style, on the fast-growing market all over the world, it is the symbol of holidays and Summer atmospheres. The couture one-piece – the "Aperitivo" version for Pool Parties and evenings after the beach – is popular with consumers who associate it with Resort wear collections.

On the men's side, swimsuits are popular with the multiplication of styles to adapt to summer activities. Swim shorts and boxers remain the big winners, but we are also seeing the big comeback of swim briefs. Comfort and innovation are the key words.

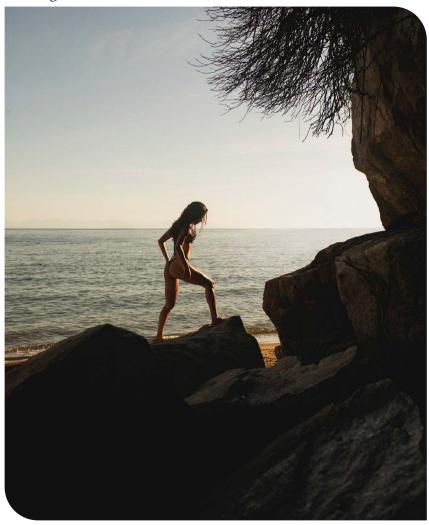

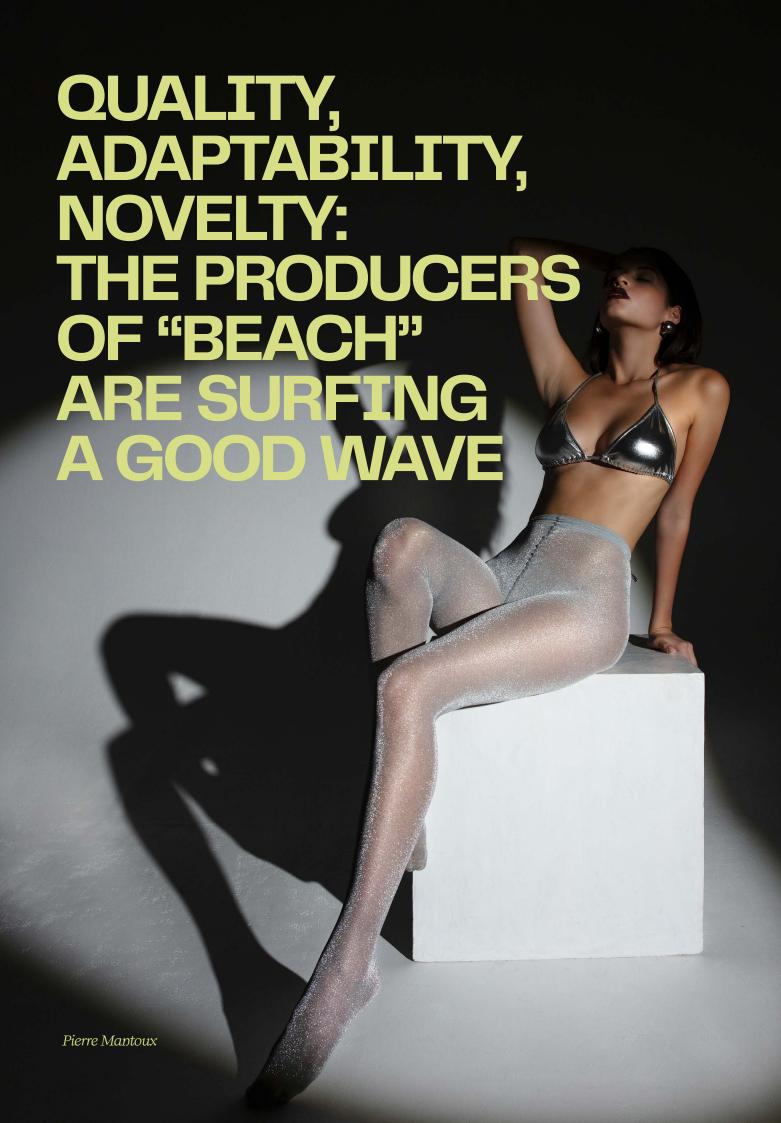

The challenging period which plunged producers of swimwear materials into a time of impatience and uncertainty did not make them sink. Far from it: "The entire beachwear and sportswear market was affected. But we persisted and when the situation stabilized, we moved forward, showing that we are very competitive in Europe, South America and the United States. We are still trying to maintain our prices despite the increases in the price of raw materials," said Nicola Iori, Commercial Director of Eurostick. The 50-year-old Italian company has several assets in the game: a great mastery of technique with recognized savoir-faire in lining, proven customer service in particular with the management of an efficient stock service, and great responsiveness.

The Client is King

Vertically integrated, Eurostick has its own dyehouse, Goal SpA, enabling them to guarantee restocking within 10 days on average. "Our teams work every day on developing new qualities while our stylists carry out detailed research to offer solutions adapted to each market", Explains Nicola Iori. If the European demand is relatively homogeneous between Italians, French, Germans or Spaniards, the American market is very particular with requests for specific designs for their customers. Eurostick is constantly expanding its collection with 70 to 80 new designs per collection, for swimwear alone with a constant simple and reassuring but never banal aesthetic. The collection highlights technical fabrics for sportswear with embossed patterns for the jacquard effect, vintageinspired prints and designs, such as the Prince de Galles, and, for beachwear in particular GRS-certified recycled fabrics with brightly coloured exotic prints and animal patterns.



Rocle

500 km away, in the Lyon region, Emmanuelle Bonnetin the Executive Director of Rocle by Isabella is delighted that her new beachwear collection, launched 5 years ago has been a success. "It's progressing tremendously. Last year we added our jacquards and woven fabrics, a mini collection of prints on different materials. We received great feedback very quickly!" There is no doubt that there is a demand for French swimwear products, which are very different from the colourful offerings of the Italian or Spanish markets.

An Inspiring French Touch

"Our customers are looking for subtle designs, dainty "liberty-style" floral prints, and subtle patterns. They crave freshness. There is no longer a "French Touch" in swimwear" observes Emanuella Bonnetin. Rocle by Isabella hit the nail on the head with their exclusive jacquards, two-tone denim-effects, and above all a new series of subtle prints. Patterns that Rocle by Isabella has drawn inspiration from the world of lingerie: delicate flowers placed on mesh backing, Indian textiles and Ikats, as well as flowers with a retro vibe.

The Director of Style and Commercial Development at A.E.T. Textiles speaks on Made in France: "There are fewer and fewer boundaries between ready-to-wear, lingerie, home wear and beachwear. This has allowed us to adapt the qualities of clothing for a beach version using specific dyes". With offerings that appeal to young brands such as: recycled polyamide or polyester knits, available in jerseys or bi-stretch satin, with different effects and patterns: lurex yarn, knitted stripes, printed patterns. The company is now even more committed to expanding its swimwear offerings with blends made from 100% French hemp and linen, combined with cotton or Tencel: jerseys, quilted fabrics; plain, striped or printed fleeces for dresses and small beach tops with glittering or pearlescent effects. Vegetable dyes used on cotton fabrics.

Directed by Jos Berry of Concepts Paris, this forum unpacks 5 major material trends for the Fall-Winter 2024–25 season, centred around the theme of around Desire.

'DESIRE TO SEDUCE'

Lace conquers leisure and the beach. Demand is growing for designs and motifs in embroidery, lace, thermo-cutting... In the spotlight: prints and accessories for beachwear. This trend opens new perspectives for luxury lingerie with the return of silk, satin, sequins and accessories such as feathers.

'DESIRE TO ESCAPE'

The growing interest in the colours and patterns of the southern hemisphere is accompanied by a desire to escape, initiated by new classifications such as Resort wear. Jacquard marks its big comeback. Large-scale Raschel Tronic laces available in pleated textures are experiencing a strong development for the beach. The trend extends to knits with pronounced ribs for loungewear and the new shiny jersey with ottoman ribs.

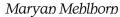
'DESIRE TO SLOW DOWN'

We have found the perfect example of a new generation of ultra-light fabrics with high elasticity: gelled knits. Emphasis is also placed on natural knits, combining noble yarns such as cotton, merino wool or cashmere mixed with cellulose and elastane for support. Ideal for all versatile knit pieces. The nightwear is warm with woven and brushed knits in soft colors and openwork cotton knits. Alongside cotton, demand is intensifying towards luxurious Merino wool blends for thermal and active lingerie.

'DESIRE TO REBEL'

Rainbow stripes, soft and colorful mohair, patchwork, warp and weft for a wardrobe that celebrates simple and uninhibited pleasure.

'DESIRE TO BE STRONG'

Circular and flat knits are back for support and aesthetics. Emphasis is also given to antiperspirant, antibacterial and anti-UV fabrics. All that glitters is essential in the world of athleisure, with new accessories and surface treatments: glossy finishes for the mesh, featherweight vinyls...



If innovation shifted standard... the world would be transformed. What if innovation didn't just allow one company to stand out, but brought together an entire profession around a single cause: saving the planet? An ideal that seems far removed from the search for performance in a world that always wants more. A mere utopia, then? Not for sure!

Joining forces to better move forward

Smart fibers, connected textiles and functional fabrics have transformed the clothing market. True enough. But innovation, the kind that revolutionizes habits and improves processes, is still a long way off. "Since the creation of synthetic fibers, the world of textiles hasn't really moved. Yes, the very notion of innovation has changed. We are revisiting technologies that exist or have existed in the past, and adapting them either to industrial criteria or to new concepts of comfort. It's urgent to innovate!", alerts Bruno Nahan, CEO of Bugis and Chairman of the Fédération de la maille, de la lingerie et du balnéaire. Unless you were born for and from innovation, and proclaim it loud and clear, even in your name - like the Italian company Innova Fabrics - the pointer is moving. Still, how far can - or should - it be moved? German lace-maker Chanty clearly has the best answer today. Taking hold of companies who are looking to digitize their collections in its wake, Chanty is taking a giant step towards zero waste. Last January, Chanty revolutionized the traditional presentation of its collections in robrack, unveiling the very first e-collection after months of research and fine-tuning. "When you realize that out of 100 designs presented, a maximum of 20 or 30 will be sold. 70% of our collections go to waste. For each design we create, we have to produce 2,000 meters of fabric for the robracks. The calculation is simple: 10 designs equal 20,000 meters of lace. You can imagine how much material and energy is wasted. Just to show designs," insists Zoya Rutskaya Sebek, Transformation Manager at Chanty. On average, no more than 3 of the 20 or so designs selected by a lingerie or corsetry customer enter the collection. The digitization of collections only makes sense if the entire profession, from material and accessory producers to garment makers, embraces digitization. And limit physical production to samples and selected models. The result: zero-waste collections and precious time savings, with production reduced to one or two weeks.

Is digital just a communication tool?

To set up her new "digital" department, 3D LAB CHANTY, Zoya Rutskaya Sebek recruited five specialists in video games, graphic design and leather goods. "In two years, we've built up real expertise. Now we need to educate and bring all these professions together, which have ideas but are too all over the place. It's a real job to adapt marketing, sales, and of course creation and design to develop 3D and make the transition to all-digital", continues Zoya. With the total digitization of collections, certain professions will disappear, but others will develop. We'll have to learn a new way of working. But that's the price we have to pay for a commitment to true eco-responsibility. Several material producers, mostly embroiderers, have gone for it. For others, discussions are ongoing because there's one thing that even the sharpest geeks struggle with: touch. No three-dimensional model can reproduce the softness or comfort of a material. Crucial in lingerie more than anywhere else. "Digital is a funnel that allows us to direct our search. For the moment, it can only be a communication tool that can be used to prospect for new customers. For asmuch as we do not succeed in analyzing materials and clearly understanding the touch and fall of the garment, the success of digitalization will remain limited," contends Bruno Nahan, who doesn't foresee any fundamental breakthrough in the clothing textile sector. He prefers to bring forward alternative proposals, responses to the climate emergency and the necessary change in our consumption habits: "If innovation focuses on these initiatives around recycled, biosourced and recyclable materials, then it has to be said that innovation is contradictory. It responds to a clear consumer demand for products that are less predatory on nature and less harmful to the environment, in a market - and this is the paradox - that has never been so vacillating, with entry-level volumes invading the market". Why is it that Generation Z, which is so committed to the environment, is the main over-consumer of a brand it should consider an environmental fallacy?, asks a well-known French news weekly about Chinese giant Shein. Ending with a generation that's just embarrassed, but has no real excuse.

Focus on additive manufacturing

Contradictory or not, one thing is certain: the success of an innovation depends on its timing. The right casting at the right time, figuratively speaking. "Although the post-covid crisis is behind us, with energy, transport and raw materials prices stabilizing, the situation remains fragile. These difficult months are leaving their mark. And yet! Crisis or not, we have to move forward, we have to innovate. Especially in times of crisis," says Fabio Cescon, founder of the new company Innova Fabrics. Three-dimensional printing, printed laminations and new lurex jacquards are at the heart of his research. Hundreds of tests on designs, colors and materials have enabled him to develop astounding effects. What about tomorrow? If lace and embroidery are digitized upstream, if knitwear is three-dimensionalized, what will happen to the manufacture of bras, for example, a part that can require up to 30 different operations? 3D-Tex, the first fully 3D knitting factory, is already producing the first sweaters in additive manufacturing, with zero waste, at its Breton 4.0 factory. "Theoretically, we are still light years away from additive manufacturing applications in clothing. 3D printing as we know is a technology for textile by-products such as baby seat parts. Yet, I really think our technology could make sense in the lingerie market. In a few years' time, we may have a case to defend," confides Aymeric Azran, founder of Nobrak, a new company based in the Occitan region and a pioneer in the manufacture of textile composite materials combining French linen and bio-plastic sourced from the New Aquitaine region. It was by working on an innovative textile process allowing several textile threads to be deposited in exactly the right place, while saving material, that the company found its niche. What if the lingerie market offered it a spot?

Action Culottée, is an association of independent traders specializing in underwear which aims to organize joint actions to defend, enhance and promote the profession and its knowhow, as well as support the trade that is closely interlinked with femininity.

Stéphanie Lherminier

STÉPHANIE LHERMINIER, MANAGER OF THE CLAIR DE LUNE BOUTIQUE IN PARIS (18E)

How long have you been doing this job? Has it evolved over time?

I have been doing this job for 18 years. I took over a shop in Paris that previously existed since the 1950s. The job has evolved a lot over time with the excitement of the internet and social media. Customers now have access to more choices without having to leave their homes.

I am sure we have lost at least 50% of retail stores over the past 20 years due to the owners retiring or other factors. From the perspective of the few existing seamstresses, our small shops (even if modern in terms of layout) often appear old-fashioned and outdated. The younger generations now only come out of necessity because they cannot find their sizes at chain stores. Therefore we are becoming more and more specialized in larger cup sizes.

This period is hectic and complicated. How do you continue to meet the expectations of your customers?

I don't do anything flashy, because luckily I'm in Paris and so people walk by and so I always have people passing by. I put everything into the fitting experience in store to try and retain my customers and hopefully get promoted by word-of-mouth. I also try to have a choice in terms of larger cups so that customers can choose the model that they like. I also took training in visual merchandising and a professional comes in to do the windows every month.

E-shop, social media, have you invested in digital and if so how?

I try my best to be active on social media, but I admit that it does

not interest me at all and I find that it is not at the soul of our profession where we are in contact rather than virtual. On Instagram the conversion rate without having an online sales website is almost non-existent. On the other hand, in order to modernize and develop sales, we are working on an online sales website.

Finally, how do you see the future of your profession?

We know from experience that the closure of Lingerie stores in geographical proximity to ours does not increase our turnover. Hence the importance of the relationship between our clients and their seamstresses. The customers often do not want to establish a new bond of trust in a new store and prefer to order on the internet. We can therefore conclude that buying methods can change for the same customer. In the future I imagine that there will be very few of us on the circuit and that suppliers will become more and more ferocious on the internet because of their distribution networks and retailers will collapse.

AUDREY MARIE, MANAGER OF JOLIE CHOSE BOUTIQUE, VENAREY-LES-LAUMES (21), AND GENERAL DIRECTOR OF THE PLUS SIZE STORY SITE (SPECIALIST IN PLUS SIZED LINGERIE FOR 2 YEARS)

How long have you been doing this job? Has it evolved over time?

Despite my 11 years of work my instillation is not very old, but there are several different economic and societal developments that have pushed our profession to specialize more and become more professional. First the decline in purchasing power has lead to customers moving to make purchases in chains and the drop of purchases in boutiques. This forces us to review our offering in order to remain competitive. Then the amalgam between the underwire bra and incompatibility with breast cancer. There are misconceptions out there, it is up to us to be informed and remain up to date on the subject to reassure customers about the products that we offer them. The result is an increase in demand for models without underwiring, and no longer just amongst customers with "classic" tastes who favour comfort. We had to review our offering, even if it means asking our suppliers for a model both with and without rein-

forcement. Finally, the "no bra" fashion that's associated with the anti-patriarchal message it conveys, with this belief that not wearing a bra allows the chest to gain more tone. This fashion has forced us to become historians in corsetry as well as disecters of medical studies, to analyze all the different ideas linked to this fashion which we hear less and less about...

Finally, where our profession was previously

synonymous with seduction, glamour, delicateness, femininity, and luxury, it has evolved towards a more technical and controversial aspect, forcing us to become real managers on the look out for trends. Fortunately we still have lace...

This period is hectic and complicated. How do you continue to meet the expectations of your customers?

It's obvious you always have to listen to their requests. They are the ones who give me the directions that I need to take, since ultimately it is because of them that I have this shop. I do not hesitate to give them a preview of the collections to come. Being specialized in larger sized lingerie, I always try to offer them innovative, funky and glamorous models, at all costs so everyone feels represented. I offer payment facilities and am very accommodating and understanding on this subject.

As a follower of body positivism, I like to transform myself into a "self-confidence" coach. They find in me an ear, empathy and benevolence.

E-shop, social media, have you invested in digital and if so how?

2 years ago when the store was already in its mature phase, and I was already using Facebook and Instagram in a classic and informal way, I had the idea of using TikTok (Mmetoutlemonde21) but from the new perspective of sharing daily life as a lingerie salesperson and giving advice in terms of fitting. It was an immediate success! My account is now followed by 185,000 followers and customers come from all over France to meet me, be advised by me and buy lingerie from me. Jolie Chose's turnover thanks to TikTok has grown by 30%, which is continuing for the moment. From this experience came the Plus Size Story site that I created at the request of followers of my TikTok account, constantly fed by my flow of followers. It got off to a good start but has grown even more since I started offering an online fitting service, and networked with influencers to promote the site. It was important for me to bring a real dimension of advice to this digital project, I like to say that I do "proximity internet."

Finally, how do you see the future of your profession?

Obviously, for me since I live in a rural area, social networks and digitization have allowed me to reach a wider clientele that I would never have met if I had carried out my activity in a more traditional way. But my physical store also gives the necessary credibility to my digital work, the two go together hand in hand.

The Internet is now omnipresent in the way our customers consume, and even if lingerie remains a technical product that needs support, increasingly technical digital tools will soon replace our experience, even if it means, we become our own competitors!

I think that in the long term there will only be true technicians left, in love with their profession and their customers, capable of perpetual questioning, who will be able to bring an extra soul to the purchase of a bra.

LAURENCE WELKENHUYZEN, MANAGER OF THE LES PRINCESSES BOUTIQUES, TILFF IN BELGIUM.

How long have you been doing this job? Has it evolved over time?

I have been working in corsetry for 30 years but I have been self-employed for 19 years. The profession has evolved because the sizes and morphology of consumers have evolved. Also because breast cancer has become a case encountered on a daily basis. By these facts, lingerie has become as much a technical article as a product of seduction.



Laurence Welkenhuyzen

This period is hectic and complicated. How do you continue to meet the expectations of your customers?

I find that, curiously, the Covid pandemic, and particularly confinement, has given consumers a greater desire to take care of themselves and do themselves good, to enjoy pretty, flirtatious and comfortable lingerie and beautiful outfits. This period was very profitable and made it possible to change the habits of all these women and to make lingerie like an addiction. Purchasing power remains very important for a certain part of the clientele who always want more, but above all the moment in the store and the care we give them. To animate my business, I regularly post new products and I am present daily on social media. I do this my way as a daily soap opera. It was the Covid that questioned my way of communicating and trying to find a "signature" specific to the store and our way of working to become a store essential to their well-being.

E-shop, social media, have you invested in digital and if so how?

I haven't invested a penny, and I'm only active on Facebook, Instagram and a little on TikTok. I'm not modern and I prefer to stay like that. And I send 5 emails a year, no more. However, it is essential to be on social media. Otherwise your business will die. I strive to surprise with atypical products and atypical sales concepts: evenings as a couple, with friends, theme evenings, photo shoots...

Finally, how do you see the future of your profession?

I look forward to it with great joy and pleasure! By advancing step by step with my customers and my suppliers. Like a craftswoman but trying to be a "step ahead". For example, I would like to hire a man, offer innovative and surprising displays. Always and constantly surprising and making people dream, never fall asleep and continue my unconditional wonder. But I will never go online. Contact with people, benevolence and more than careful hospitality will remain my priorities. There is always champagne and chocolates to make these moments even more exceptional.

ALINE TRAN, MANAGER OF THE RITUELLES BOUTIQUES, PARIS (18E) AND CO-MANAGER OF THE ACTION CULOTTÉES COLLECTIVE.



Aline Tran

How long have you been doing this job? Has it evolved over time?

I opened the shop at the end of 2016, so maybe too recently to see a marked evolution over time. I decided to distribute only creators so I'm already in a niche.

However, we can distinguish several axes: Ethics. I feel that people are paying more and more attention to the materials, the manufacturing country, etc. This forces me to know my products by heart, in addition to developing a relationship of trust with my suppliers (because I cannot audit them myself, so everything is based on trust!). The No Bra. Since the covid, the No Bra trend has accelerated, developing in me a pleasure/impulse purchase more than a purely functional purchase. Customers love the style and have fun with lingerie, like a fashion product. The uniqueness. My proposal is quite sharp compared to traditional shops and people like this exclusivity. They won't find the parts I have anywhere else (except on the internet). Seduction is no longer taboo. It is even fully assumed and this can result in the appearance of an upside–down trend, for example.

This period is hectic and complicated. How do you continue to meet the expectations of your customers?

Human interaction is extremely important. I am still convinced that everything happens in the exchange. It happens in details like memorizing their first name or their height, regularly paying attention to the little details, and finally knowing what they will like before they do. Covid has also strengthened the bond with my existing clients. It developed a lot of empathy for independent businesses and, personally, I had a lot of support and, somewhere, I still feel the effects.

Before the Covid, I organized a lot of events in-store (about one per month) but not specifically related to lingerie. Rather artistic:

a new exhibition with a vernissage, flash tattoo sessions, book signings, photo shoots... This artistic angle allows me to distinguish myself from other shops and to stir up a population that would not have maybe never set foot in my store. It earns me very little turnover so these events have more of a purpose of communication, differentiation and animation. We have also collaborated with the perfumer on my street and I plan to continue with local collaborations.

I also force myself to keep my knowledge up to date in terms of materials, product development and new brands. I am on permanent standby. First of all because I like it and also to establish my position as an expert with my clients. It is important that they see us as experts and advisers (we could almost use the word coach) rather than as salespeople or managers. Already because it's the truth but also because it sounds sexier!

E-shop, social media, have you invested in digital and if so how?

From the beginning, I worked on my e-shop and on social media platforms because it was obvious to me. I have never considered online stores as dangerous competitors because the human exchange will never be the same as in a physical store, regardless of the technologies developed. The e-shop was released 3 months after the opening of the store, it represents very little of my turnover but it brings me a lot of traffic in the store just like Instagram. I regularly send newsletters which bring me some traffic in store and some online sales. Not a lot, but the time spent/turnover ratio is correct and it gives a reminder to customers who have forgotten us.

Since September 2022, I have taken on a freelance web writer to write blog articles on my site to work on SEO. My next step? Develop LinkedIn.

Finally, how do you see the future of your profession?

The increase in prices is a real subject because it slows down even the most loyal customers. And the recessionary climate is not helping either. I bet everything on human relationship and differentiation. I think the profession will continue but will be increasingly rare and unfortunately "reserved" for people who have found their niche, renew themselves and question themselves. A lot of lingerie stores have closed and/or are not taken over after retirement, there may be a gap to be made in the transmission.

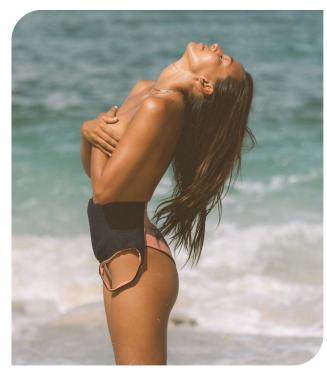

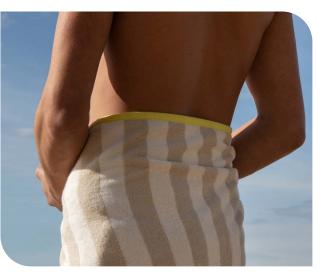
